

ELIE WIESEL: AN ELOQUENT SURVIVOR

A Final Message From Elie Wiesel

Millions of words are being written right now about the late Elie Wiesel, ז"ל, by figures ranging from world statesmen to celebrities of every stripe.

My own brief encounter with Mr. Wiesel and the way it transpired made an indelible, if not haunting, impression on me. It took place at the annual dinner of the Crown Heights-based Bnos Menachem school for girls, where he was the featured keynote speaker.

I noticed him sitting quietly at the reception and decided to approach him. Like so many others, I was familiar with Mr. Wiesel's work but had never met him. Because he had already spoken and written so much about the Holocaust, I felt that to engage him in a conversation about the Holocaust would not yield anything new, and he looked frail and exhausted.

When I approached him to greet him a thought popped into my head and I asked him: "Mr.

Wiesel, what do you think about every day?"

I figured that the answer to this question would let me know what was most important to him. He looked up at me with tired eyes and replied, "I put on *tefillin* every morning and I am a *Vizhnitzer chassid*." His father, he said, had been a *Vizhnitzer chassid* and he therefore had an affinity for the *Vizhnitzer Rebbes* that he knew.

It was clear to me that he was conveying a message. It was a defining statement for Elie Wiesel.

Like many other Holocaust survivors, Elie Wiesel had struggled with his faith following the Holocaust. By telling me that he was a *Vizhnitzer chassid* and put on *tefillin*, he was letting the world know that he had made peace with what he had experienced.
